




After being challenged by the U.S. Department of Justice, Ohio's juvenile justice agency reduced the solitary confinement of its young inmates last year.

A new report by the Ohio Department of Youth Services shows seclusion of inmates declined by more than 66 percent in 2014 from the previous year.


The report says that average solitary confinement hours per youth dropped to about 152 hours last year compared with about 490 in 2013.







- Clarify who we are





Proposed Budget


Facilities (in millions)

Proposed Budget: Community

- RECLAIM Ohio Subsidy Grant remains at \$30.6 million
- Youth Services Subsidy Grant remains at \$16.7 million
- Community Corrections Facilities increases by 11.6% from \$19.9 million in FY 14 to \$22.2 million in FY 16*
 - Mostly attributed to the increased costs at Montgomery County Center for Adolescent Services for our girls unit)
- Community Programs funding (Behavioral Health/Juvenile Justice, Targeted RECLAIM, and Competitive RECLAIM) remain at \$11 million


Proposed Budget: Central Office

- Decrease of \$500,000 per year
- Reductions by attrition
- Every vacancy is scrutinized
